President’s Message

Here’s a question for all of our members: “Are you having fun practicing law?” I hope the answer is “yes”.



To be sure, the practice of law is not without hardship. The long hours and consequent limitation on our free time represents one of the greatest downsides to our profession.

In addition, our relationship with opposing counsel is not always pleasant. Although I am convinced that we enjoy a much higher degree of civility among the bar in Virginia Beach (and indeed, throughout Virginia) than most of our brethren across the country, there are unfortunate exceptions to every rule.

Moreover, our clients are not universally understanding and appreciative of our efforts. Our satisfaction level plummets when the client seems more focused on the extra two cents they see on their bill than the excellent result they may have received.

Another challenge to our job satisfaction relates to the increasing role that marketing plays in our profession. Without new clients and new work, we cannot pay our overhead and feed our families. Thus, in addition to the time we must spend generating billable hours, it seems that we must devote an ever-increasing amount of time to marketing and bringing in new business.

Despite these challenges, if I had the chance to start over, I would choose the same profession. For many of us, the daily intellectual challenge keeps our job interesting. Most new cases or assignments present a new twist – a new puzzle to figure out. If you are a litigator, you may have the opportunity to become an expert in a potentially endless string of subjects.

The chance to meet and interact with new people represents another benefit to many lawyers. Most new engagements provide

an opportunity to work with a new client, as well as the chance to interact with another lawyer. One of the most fulfilling aspects of our job can be the chance to meet and help new clients, and to meet new attorneys from throughout the state, or even the country. Dealing with an opposing lawyer who can become a friend and future point of contact after the case is over has been one of the most rewarding aspects of my work.

For litigators, there is no greater high than winning. Winning can take many forms and may not necessarily reflect an outright judgment for your client. Prevailing on a hard-fought

Law Day 2005 at Wahab by Pat Jones

Over 200 people visited the law library on Wednesday, May 25th, the day we selected to celebrate “The American Jury” in honor of Law Day. The library was



decorated with flowers and balloons and three tables were set with cake, fruits, snacks, and soda for our guests. Two videos, “Jury Duty Orientation” and “Your Day in Court”, were available for viewing.

As a planned event for the day, staff offered tours of the library that included a brief introduction to the city, state, and federal laws and court decisions in our print and electronic collections and offered suggestions for researching these books and databases. Twenty-one students and three teachers from Tidewater Tech took advantage of this opportunity, as did several individuals.

Twelve students from the Virginia Beach Public Schools Legal Studies Academy also received a tour and wrote essays on the topic of the American Jury for our First Annual Law Day Essay Contest. The winning essay by Ebony Callistro, “Appreciating the Gift of a Jury”, is published in the Summer edition of our newsletter, *Legal Briefs*.



The students were excited to play the “Legal Bingo” game created by one of our staff, Jean Tancredi, and selected their prizes from an overflowing basket containing an assortment of books and games, but the most popular choice was candy. Other students tested their knowledge of juries, taking the quiz offered on the American Bar Association web site that was bookmarked on all five workstations in the public computer room.

Fourteen members of the Virginia Beach Bar Association, recruited by the VBBA Law Day Committee Chair Jeff Marks, provided brief consultations to nineteen walk-in pro se litigants and four telephone callers. Consultation areas were set up in the adjacent VBBA office (courtesy of Jean Keary),

the Law Librarian’s office (courtesy of Alyssa Altshuler), and an area arranged in the back corner of the law library. The call-in feature was such a success that we intend to repeat the feature for future Law Day events.

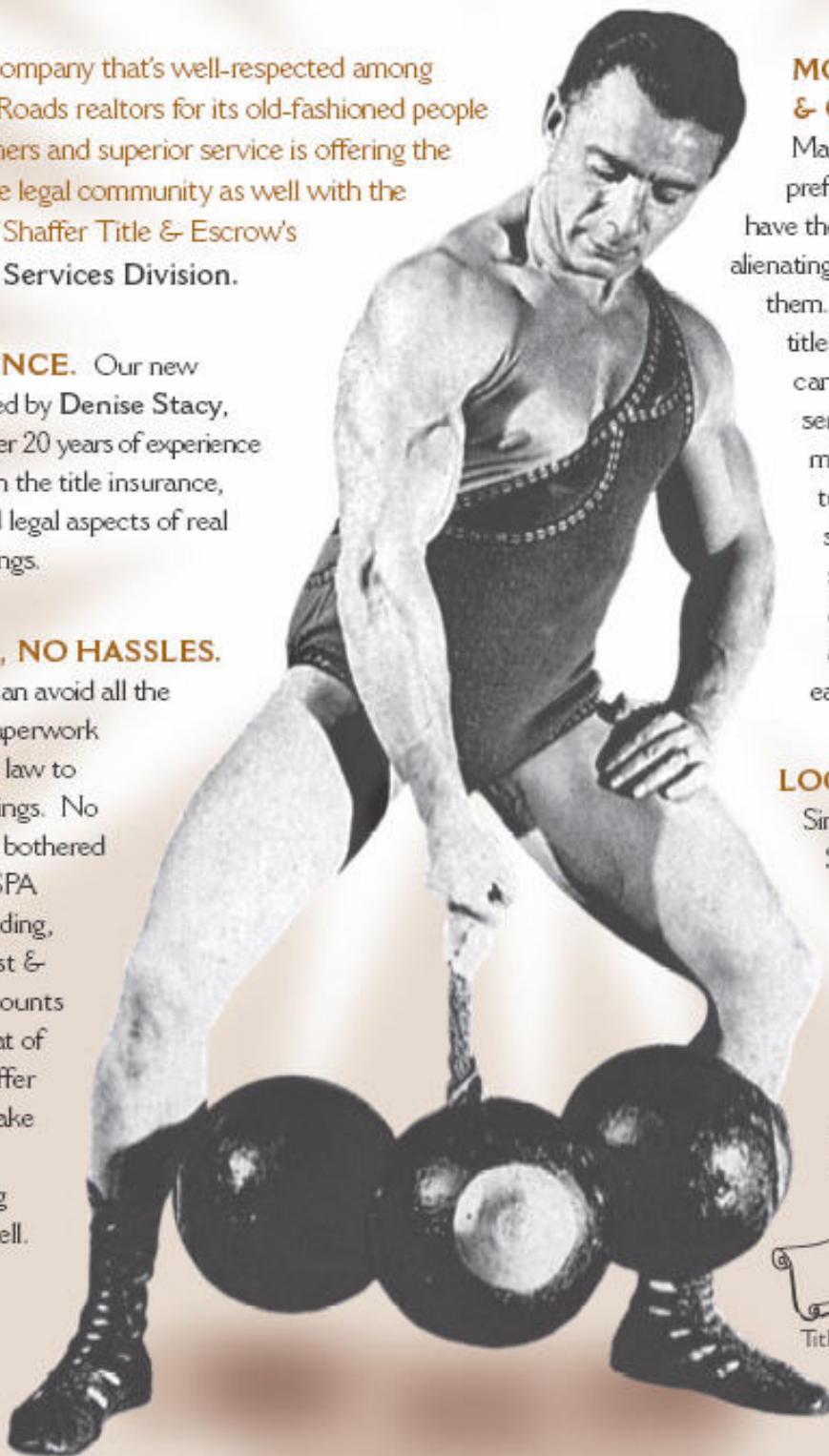

Court News - Short Circuits

Practice tips from the Circuit Court

IT'S NO SECRET: CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION AND DECREES OF REFERENCE IN DIVORCES

“Confidential Information:” Where do social security numbers go now?

If you answered, “Not in divorce decrees,” your answer would be wrong! No changes were made to any of the statutes requiring social security numbers in decrees (e.g., § 20-91(B) and § 20-60.3). Section 20-121.03 states that if such information is required by law, it still must be provided but must be in an addendum. At a minimum, the Clerk’s Office needs social security numbers in support orders to comply with state processing requirements. Therefore, if you do not have social security numbers in your decree, they need to be provided in an addendum with your decree. Also, please note that you should not make all the 20-60.3 notices part of the addendum – just the social security numbers.

What does an “Addendum” for confidential information look like?

The Supreme Court has developed a form Addendum, available on the court’s website at www.vbgov.com/courts. You can access it by clicking on “divorce” and then choosing the contested or uncontested option. The form will be in the box marked “related content.” Essentially, it just provides a grid for entering social security and account numbers. Whatever format you use, **please, please try to highlight or flag your addendum!** The Clerk’s Office will really appreciate it if you can make their job of finding and segregating the addendum easier.

What should I do if I need to file an “old” separation agreement that has confidential information in it?

This is a question I’ve wondered about since I first found out about this statute. Some attorneys have inquired about whether they can black that information out. That is something I personally would not be comfortable with, absent researching any effects on the validity of the agreement. Another possibility is to file the entire agreement in a manila envelope labeled “Addendum – Confidential Information Pursuant to § 20-121.03,” and provide a cover letter or the like advising that the separation agreement is in the

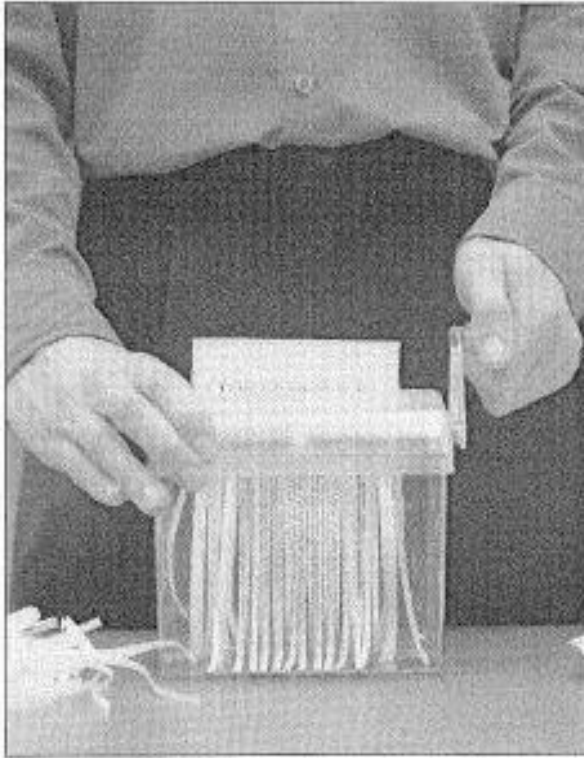
envelope. This is also an imperfect solution because nothing authorizes keeping the *entire* separation agreement confidential. However, for now, pending some refinements by statute, rule, or otherwise, that is probably the most workable solution.

New format for decrees of reference

Matters may only be referred to a commissioner by (1) agreement of the parties with concurrence of the court; or (2) on motion of a party or the court AND with a finding of good cause. A decree of reference needs to reflect compliance with these requirements. Therefore, **decrees of reference must state that the matter is being referred by agreement of the parties or upon good cause shown.** One example of good cause is where the defendant has executed a waiver or failed to enter an appearance after proper service, and plaintiff seeks to have the matter referred to a commissioner. Form decrees of reference with the necessary language are available at the court’s website, listed above. The form is at the same location as the addendum – under “related content.”

Reminder for those proceeding under the contested divorce procedures: leave yourself time to complete all the requirements!

If you choose to have a contested divorce heard by a judge, you really need to thoroughly review the court’s contested procedures manual. There is a lot more to it than just getting a trial date, and even more than just having a divorce pretrial order entered. For example, if child support, custody, or visitation is at issue, the parties need to attend the parental education seminar and a mediation session. Counsel must also prepare a number of forms required for the contested issues. So, when you are setting a matter for trial, be sure the date you select will allow you and your client time to complete everything that is required. As with other items mentioned in this article, the manual and required forms are available at the court’s website.

State Bar Criminal Law Section Elects Virginia Beach Commonwealth's Attorney as Chairman

Virginia Beach's Commonwealth's Attorney *Harvey Bryant* was elected as Chairman of the Criminal Law Section of the Virginia State Bar at its annual meeting June 17, 2005 at the Cavalier Hotel in Virginia Beach. The Criminal Law Section is the second largest section of the Virginia State Bar with a membership of over 2,000 defense attorneys, prosecutors and judges.

The section is best known for its annual day long seminars in February of each year in Williamsburg and Charlottesville. Approximately 800 attendees earn continuing education credits for the classes and course materials that are presented. In addition, approximately eight times per year the section issues a newsletter with case law updates and other matters of interest to those practicing criminal law.

Bryant is a 1968 graduate of the College of William and Mary and a 1974 graduate of the University of Richmond Law School. His career includes nine years of private practice and twenty-two years as both a state and federal prosecutor. He also serves as secretary and board member of the Commonwealth's Attorney's Services Council and secretary/treasurer and board member of the Virginia Association of Commonwealth's Attorneys.

The Virginia Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers announces that it is sponsoring a new program to improve the quality of indigent defense representation in Virginia. The program, *Mentorship for Indigent Defense Counsel*, is partly funded by a grant from the Virginia Law Foundation.

Volunteer mentors from the Virginia Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers who have at least five years criminal defense experience will be paired with mentees having less experience who serve as court-appointed criminal defense counsel in Virginia state courts. The program is free, and membership in the Virginia Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers is not required for mentees. In addition to working closely with volunteer mentors, all mentees will have the benefit of a mentorship email listserv for sharing information about particular jurisdictions, keeping up with the latest criminal law developments, and exchanging legal theories, as well as a staffed help desk for specific questions that mentors may not be able to answer.

Virginia Code § 19.2-163.03, (effective on July 1, 2005) aims to improve indigent defense by establishing new training and certification requirements for indigent defense counsel. The Virginia Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers has joined in the effort to find innovative ways to improve the quality of representation that is afforded to indigent defendants. An example of VACDL's commitment to public service, *Mentorship for Indigent Defense Counsel*, provides new resources, at no cost to taxpayers, for the improvement of Virginia's criminal justice system.
