RECENT VIRGINIA BEACH CIRCUIT COURT OPINIONS

LAURA LYNNE GREENWOOD V. MICHAEL RAYMOND GOSSNER, SR., DOCKET NO.: CL14-1506 (JUDGE CROSHAW, 10/20/14)

– this appeal from J&D involved issue of jurisdiction over the former husband and whether the presumptive limitation on the duration of reserving spousal support applied. The parties were divorced in 2005, and both their agreement and decree simply stated spousal support was reserved. Wife first filed for an award of spousal support in 2014. First, husband argued there was no jurisdiction over him. The court found that § 8.01-328.1(8) applied to provide jurisdiction, holding that a reservation of spousal support constituted an obligation to pay support as contemplated by the statute. Next, by analogizing to § 20-109 and cases decided thereunder, the court held that the statutory presumption applied in the face of a silent agreement. Accordingly, husband's motion to dismiss was sustained.

RODNEY CHISHOLM V. TRACY K. HAYES, DOCKET NO.: CL14-2020 (JUDGE CROSHAW, 10/20/14)

– this matter involved a request by father to offset mother's interest in his military retirement against child support arrearages, and a request by mother to modify child support. The court addressed the issue of whether it had jurisdiction to modify child support, and the authority to offset mother's marital interest in the military retirement. As for jurisdiction, the court found that it had concurrent jurisdiction with J&D, but declined to exercise it as support modification was better addressed by J&D. On the issue of offset, the court relied upon Nkopchieu v. Minlend, 59 Va. App. 299 (2011), to find that it could modify equitable distribution of the pension to offset arrearages.

DANIEL GREGG WIGGIN V. COMMONWEALTH OF VIRGINIA, DOCKET NO.: CL14-4102 (JUDGE O'BRIEN, 10/29/14)

– petitioner sought to expunge charges of Code of Virginia § 46.2-868.1, Aggressive Driving and Virginia Beach Code § 23-10, Disorderly Conduct. He was found not guilty of aggressive driving, but the General District Court found the facts were sufficient to find guilt on the disorderly conduct charge and deferred disposition to a later date, pending Petitioner's successful completion of the conditions of probation. The conditions were successfully completed and that charge was then dismissed. At issue was expungement of the disorderly conduct charge. Petitioner argued that the warrant for that charge was void because

it charged him under a prior version of the relevant statute. The court held that the warrant was not void and gave the defendant sufficient notice of the "cause and nature" of the offense of disorderly conduct. Accordingly, the request to expunge that charge was denied.

JAIME SIMON V. DENNIS SIMON, DOCKET NO.: CL12-4132 (JUDGE O'BRIEN. 11/12/14)

- the court addressed several issues in this divorce case. First, it granted father the right of first refusal for visitation with his son any time Plaintiff is unable to care for him for five (5) hours or more, over mother's objection that he was just trying to keep her parents from spending time with their grandson. The court considered the factors of § 20-124.3 as supporting this request, as well that § 20-124.2(B) gives the parent-child relationship priority. Next, the court addressed a request to reserve child support to J&D, finding that since this was not agreed upon, § 16.1-244(A) required the circuit court to decide the issue. In setting child support, the court refused to find wife was voluntarily unemployed, since the parties' son had previously suffered a stroke and mother needed to be available on an as-needed basis for school-related issues. Thus, she could not be gainfully employed under these circumstances. Finally, the court found that neither party should be awarded attorney's fees.

COMMONWEALTH OF VIRGINIA V. DEVON DONTEL THOMPSON, DOCKET NOS.: CR13-2752 AND CR14-2500 (JUDGE FRUCCI, 11/12/14)

– defendant sought to suppress his statements to police based upon a claim that they were taken in violation of his Miranda rights and were involuntary. Defendant, who was 19 years old and had no prior criminal record at the time of his statements, argued that he did not knowingly and voluntarily waive his rights due to his youth, and lack of experience with the criminal system and Miranda. The court rejected these arguments, finding that the defendant indicated he understood his rights and answered questions, without ever indicating confusion or an intent to invoke his rights. He also showed sufficient understanding of the criminal system since he asked the officers whether they would help him out in setting a bond if he provided certain information. At the same time, the officers' offer to assist him with a bond reduction was not a promise of leniency and did not overbear defendant's will.
Motion to suppress denied.

Practice tips from the Circuit Court

CLARIFYING FRIDAY CONTESTED DIVORCE DOCKET REQUIREMENTS

As of September 5, 2014, the court amended Procedure 1(d) of the Uncontested Divorce Manual to elaborate on when an otherwise uncontested divorce may be directed to the Friday Contested Docket. First, if the parties seek to rely upon any portion of a separation period that involves residing in the same house, the matter cannot proceed by affidavit or hearing request. Instead, a Friday Contested Divorce Docket Request must be submitted. Likewise, if the matter requires proof that goes beyond the uncontested questions in the Uncontested Divorce Manual, the Friday Contested Divorce Docket procedures will have to be followed.

Admittedly, "Friday Contested Divorce Docket" is a misnomer for these situations, but counsel are reminded that the manual for this docket states in ¶ 1.0 that the procedures also apply "to suits which the Court directs to be placed on this docket due to special circumstances." However, it is a simpler designation to use than "Friday Contested/Selected Cases/Separate in Same House" docket. Also, because the court retains flexibility to deal with a variety of unique circumstances in requesting that matters be placed on this

docket, it is obviously not possible to spell out every type of case that might apply to. However, hopefully this clarification will assist counsel in calculating the course of their divorce case.

On another Friday Contested Divorce Docket note, requests for this docket are not approved until a judge reviews the matter and determines whether or not the contested issues can actually be heard in one hour. If the judge decides it will take more than an hour, the law clerk rejects the request with an indication of which judge made the determination. Needless to say, no one simply accepts this type of rejection, and everyone wants to present an argument as to why it really can be heard in an hour. In that situation, you need to submit your arguments directly to the judge who made the decision. Emailing and arguing with the law clerk that sent the return, and seeking to have him or her act as intermediary to present your arguments to the judge, is neither effective nor appropriate in this situation. So, please send your correspondence directly to the judge, and the court will advise you one way or another whether your request will be approved.
