History of The CASA Program

Originated in Seattle, Washington by J&DRC Judge

- Social workers were overwhelmed with the number of abuse and neglect cases
- Judge wanted to know more about the children in order to make appropriate decisions
- Judge recruited a group of friends to serve as his "eyes and ears" outside of the court
- Program was deemed as a best practice and other states adopted the concept

National CASA

National CASA (NCASAA) is a member association which supports and promotes CASA advocacy so that every child victim of abuse and neglect can have a safe permanent.

NCASAA provides:

- Training and Curriculum
- Technical Assistance and Quality Assurance
- Volunteer Recruitment and Public Awareness
- Resource Development and Grants

Virginia Beach CASA is an accredited member of NCASAA



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Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS)


DCJS is the regulatory agency that oversees the 27 CASA programs across the State of Virginia

DCJS responsibilities:

- Provide oversight for CASA Programs statewide
- Adopt Regulations
- Manage the Advisory Committee
- Administer state appropriation grant funding







Virginia CASA Programs have Legal Authority to Operate

Sections 9.1-151 -158 of the Code of Virginia

Rules Relating to the Court Appointed Special Advocate Program (6 VAC 20-160-10 et seq.)



What Do CASA Volunteers DO?

Per the Code of Virginia, there are 5 Duties of a CASA Volunteer



5 Duties of a CASA Volunteer

#1

Investigate the case to which assigned to provide independent factual information to the court.



5 Duties of a CASA Volunteer

#2

Submit to the court a written report of the investigation in compliance with the provisions of § 16.1-274. The report may, upon request of the court, include recommendations as to the child's welfare, including:

- Where the child should reside
 - Visitation with the parents
- Treatment plan for the parents
 - · Treatment plan for the child



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5 Duties of a CASA Volunteer

#3

Monitor the case to which they are assigned to ensure compliance with the court's orders.



5 Duties of a CASA Volunteer



Assist any appointed Guardian Ad Litem to represent the child in providing effective representation of the child's needs and best interests.



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5 Duties of a CASA Volunteer

#5

Report a suspected abused or neglected child (mandated reporters)



Roles and Responsibilities of CASA Volunteers

Provide information to the court regarding the child's best interests.

Submit a report to the court which may include recommendations.

Advocate for the child and remain consistent during the complex legal process.



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Roles and Responsibilities of CASA Volunteers

Explains the roles of judges, lawyers, and social workers to the child.

Assists the Guardian Ad Litem appointed to the case.



CASA Volunteers DO NOT

- Investigate allegations of abuse
- Provide direct services (transportation, counseling, shelter, etc.)
- Provide legal representation during the case.
- Represent the child's wishes in court.
- Replace a social worker.



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CASA Volunteers and GALs


The CASA volunteer and GAL have the opportunity to work the most collaboratively in the Virginia model.

BUT

The CASA Volunteer and GAL are also independent and can maintain that independence if need be.

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CASA Volunteers and GALs

Per "Advocacy In Motion:"

- GALs are encouraged to contact the CASA volunteer and coordinate all aspects of the investigation with him/her.
- CASA Volunteers can offer significant information and assistance to the GAL, such as interviewing hard-to-reach witnesses.
- CASA may also be able to supplement information gathered by the GAL. Meeting the child with the CASA may also be appropriate.

CASA Volunteers and GALs

- CASA Volunteers work jointly and cooperatively with GALs.
- CASA Volunteers work at the pleasure of the Judge, but can work in collaboration with the GAL.

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CASA Volunteer Training and Qualifications

CASA volunteers must pass rigorous background checks and meet stringent screening requirements.

Training requirements include 30 pre-service hours and 12 annual in-service hours.

Upon completion of training, sworn in to serve under oath by the chief JDRC judge



CASA Partnerships

- Guardian Ad Litem codified relationship
- Department of Social Services
- Court personnel
- System professionals involved in each case
- Funding agencies/organizations



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CASA Works in Virginia!

FY13 Outcomes

Virginia CASA programs produce effective outcomes for children

- 97% of CASA volunteer recommendations are accepted by the court and are reflected in court orders and service plans
- Upon case closure, in 81% of the cases the CASA volunteer determined the child was placed in a safe/permanent home



Proven Results

Per National CASA Statistics

A child with a CASA volunteer is:

- More likely to be adopted
- Half as likely to re-enter foster care
- Substantially less likely to spend time in long-term foster care
- More likely to have a plan for permanency, especially children of color
- Ordered more services while in the system
- More likely to pass all courses
- Less likely to bounce from home to home
- Less likely to have poor conduct in school
- Less likely to be expelled
